# BOROUGH MARKET

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RECIPE

5.1

*This speedy fruit crumble is a stunning dessert and classic comfort food at its best, especially when outside it's cold and the kitchen oven fills the house with an irresistible smell.*

## Ingredients

- 500 g fruit (you can use any fruit or combination of fruit according to the season)
- 75 g sugar
- 50 g cold butter, chopped
- 100 g flour
- 50 g raw sugar

## Method

- ⊕ Preheat the oven to 180 °C.
- ⊕ Slice the fruit directly into the pie dish. Mix together the fruit and the sugar.
- ⊕ In a bowl, using your fingertips, rub the butter into the flour until the mixture has a breadcrumb-like texture. Do not overwork it: the result should be a bit lumpy
- ⊕ Add in the raw sugar and sprinkle the crumb mixture over the fruit until completely covered.
- ⊕ Bake for 35-45 minutes or until golden brown, and the fruit is tender. Leave to cool for 5 minutes.
- ⊕ You can serve the crumble topped with ice cream or whipped cream.
- ⊕ Tip: To add an extra element of flavour and texture, oats, almonds, nuts or cinnamon can be added to the crumble mix.

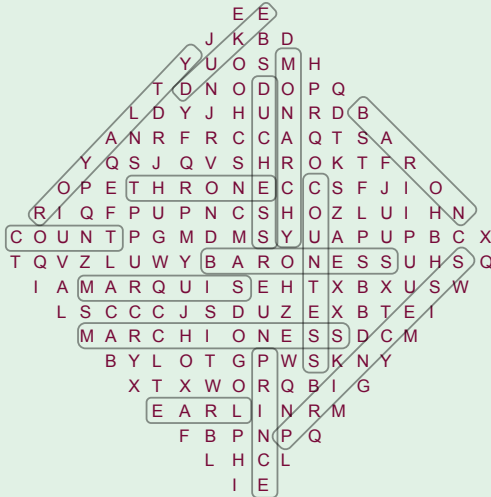

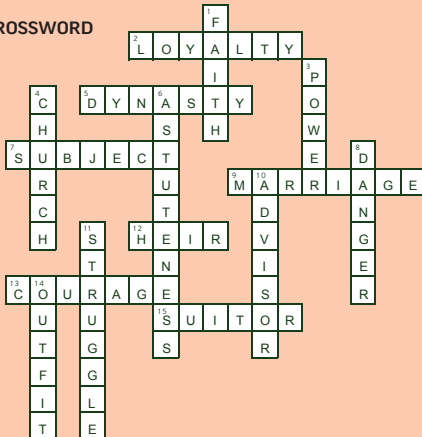
